to the crowd an update on their efforts to control grazing, restore illegal Off-Highway Vehicle trails, and support the efforts of the Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee. Preserve Manager, Jill Estrada,

Noted biologist Dr. Phil Leitner presented an overview of the Mohave ground squirrel, the status of their population, and the challenges and hopes for the future. Mohave grounds squirrels have had a sharp decline in numbers due to the long drought California recently had, and their continued presence will rely on winter rains and lush spring vegetation.

Jun Lee Awarded at Desert Tortoise Council Symposium

The Desert Tortoise Council
Symposium took place from February 23 - 25
and included numerous exciting and
thought-provoking presentations on desert
conservation. Jun Lee, Director of land
acquisition for the Desert Tortoise Preserve
Committee, gave a talk about the thirty years
he has dedicated to helping DTPC acquire
tortoise habitat within Kern, San Bernardino,
and Riverside Counties. Jun started working



with DTPC just out of college after being introduced to the organization by his college roommate, Roger Dale, who once held the position of President on the Board. Since that time, Jun has formed long-standing relationships with many landowners and has helped the DTPC acquire its more than 7,500 acres of land that it currently owns and manages. To celebrate these contributions, the Desert Tortoise Council awarded Jun with the Kristin H. Berry award, an award given to a unique individual or organization that has contributed to the conservation of desert tortoises. We offer Jun congratulations for receiving this award and thank him for his decades of work.

Meet a Director: Ron Berger, President

Ron Berger has had a lifelong interest in conservation, serving for many years on the Board of Trustees of the Nature Conservancy of Oregon. Ron serves on the Board of the Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee (DTPC), and as founder and President of The Desert Tortoise Conservancy.

Mr. Berger is majority shareholder of two pizzeria chains; Schmizza International, Inc. and Figaro's Italian Pizza, Inc. He serves as Chairman and CEO of both. Mr. Berger has been called 'a serial entrepreneur' by Inc. Magazine, having started, bought and sold dozens of businesses. Most

notably, from 1980 to September 2000, he served as founder, Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Rentrak Corporation in Portland, Oregon, an information and payment processor which in 2015 achieved a market capitalization on NASDAQ of over \$1 billion. Mr. Berger founded the business with a \$1,000 investment. He has served three terms as a member of the Board of Directors of the International Franchise Association and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Diversity Institute of the International Franchise Association. He has served and continues to serve on the boards of a number of for profit and non-profit organizations.

"I have loved the desert and desert tortoise for over 25 years and it gives me great pleasure to protect and educate people regarding this sometimes hard to find desert dinosaur. For me, when you are observing them in their natural habitat it is just amazing."

Tina shares our passion for desert tortoises and their habitat and we welcome her as our 2018 full-time naturalist! As spring commences shortly, we invite you all out to the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area to enjoy the serenity of Fremont Valley and hopefully catch a glimpse of a tortoise foraging for spring flowers. 

THE DTPC INVITES PUBLIC COMMENTS ON OHV GRANT APPLICATION

The Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee (DTPC) invites public comments on its preliminary grant applications to the California State Parks Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) Division. The DTPC is requesting funding to support additional fencing and restoration in the western expansion area as well as the restoration of the eastern expansion area using nursery grown plants sourced from locally collected seeds. The purpose of the Restoration Grants Program, as defined by the OHMVR Division, is to provide Ecological Restoration or Repair to habitat damaged by authorized or unauthorized OHV use. The DTPC will provide 26% matching dollars to the project. If funded, the DTPC will complete fencing in the western expansion area and add more intensive restoration practices to the already fenced eastern expansion area.

The DTPC would appreciate your comments on these projects. You can review the grant applications, along with those from other agencies, local governments, and non-profits, on-line at www.ohv.parks.ca.gov. The public comment period is open from Tuesday, March 6, 2018 to Monday, April 2, 2018. Comments should be sent directly to the OHMVR Division at ohvinfo@parks.ca.gov and to the DTPC at dtpc@pacbell.net. Late comments will be forwarded to the division separately. Final grant applications are due May 7, 2018. Please contact the DTPC office at (951) 683 - 3872 or dtpc@pacbell.net for additional information.




