

#### **Land Trust Accreditation**

We are applying for accreditation through the Land Trust Accreditation Commission (LTAC), an independent program of the Land Trust Alliance. The LTAC recognizes land conservation organizations that meet national quality standards for protecting important natural places. As an organization dedicated to managing and restoring lands for species of concern, the LTAC accreditation is an important next step for the growth and stewardship activities for the DTPC. The LTAC commission invites public comment regarding our application and how the DTPC complies with national quality standards. #### California Parks OHV Grant

The Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee (DTPC) invites public comments on its preliminary grant application to the California State Parks Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Recreation (OHMVR) Division. The DTPC is requesting funding to support restoration monitoring and restoration efforts in all areas adjacent to the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area. The purpose of the Restoration Grants Program, as defined by the OHMVR Division, is to provide Ecological Restoration or Repair to habitat damaged by authorized or unauthorized OHV use. The DTPC seeks funds to continue monitoring and restoration efforts related to unauthorized OHV activity on approximately 5200 acres of conservation land. The DTPC will provide some matching dollars to the project. If funded, the DTPC will be hiring an American Conservation Crew to conduct all restoration monitoring in areas directly adjacent to the DTRNA, use a citizen science approach to report fence damage and illegal incursions, use funds to repair fence damage due to incursions, and control invasive species along boundary areas commonly traveled by OHV users.

The DTPC would appreciate your comments on this project. You can review the grant application, along with those from other agencies, local governments, and non-profits, on-line at www.ohv.parks.ca.gov. The public comment period is open from Tuesday, March 3, 2020 to Monday, May 4, 2020. Comments should be sent directly to the OHMVR Division at ohvinfo@parks.ca.gov and to the DTPC at dtpc@tortoise-tracks.org. Late comments will be forwarded to the division separately.

#### 2020 Naturalist Season

We are excited to introduce our naturalist team for the 2020 season! Corina Godoy (pictured right) will be joining us as our full-time naturalist, while Lisa LaVelle (pictured below) will be returning as our part time naturalist. Corina, a Victorville, California native, is a graduate of Humboldt State University with a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Policy and Management and a minor in Botany. She has extensive experience including an internship at the Chicago Botanic Garden, where she researched competition induced mechanical defenses of *Koeleria macrantha*, a perennial grass native to California; and the Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden, where she worked in the herbarium, nursery, and monitored establishment and success of native species in fire-damaged areas. She recently held a research assistantship at Cedar Creek Ecosystem Science Reserve in Bethel, Minnesota, where she focused on forest biodiversity through applied ecological field and laboratory methods including invasive species removal, field surveys, and environmental DNA sampling. Corina is very excited to be joining the Desert Tortoise Preserve Commit-



tee and working in the biome she calls home! She is excited to formally acquaint herself with the local flora and fauna, and to be an integral part of the conservation and education efforts of the DTPC.

#### Naturalist Season Special Events

Desert Closeup: An Introduction to Macro Photography - Saturday, April 4 beginning at 9am. Spend a

Saturday at the DTRNA learning extreme closeup photography with photographer Tom Astle (tomastlephotography.com). This half-day workshop is for any skill or experience level. Whether you have a DSLR camera, are thinking of getting your first "big" camera, or even just want to get better at using your phone, you'll pick up pointers on composition, lighting, lenses, and more. Tom will also talk about the important subject of nature photography ethics, and he'll have a limited amount of extra gear that you can try out. The day will start with an equipment demonstration and a discussion of photography basics, then you'll hit the trails for photo practice. At lunch, Tom will answer more



questions, then he'll be available the rest of the day should you like to stick around for more informal advice. Limited to 15 participants. Cost is \$40 per person; 100% of the proceeds go to the Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee.

**Naturalist Guided Walk** – Saturday, April 18 at the DTRNA. During this guided nature walk participants will explore the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area with our Naturalist, learning about tortoise habitat, biology, and the effects of predation, particularly of ravens, on tortoise populations. Easy, approximately 2-mile hike. Free and open to all ages. Limited to 20 participants.

**Field Sketching** – Sunday, April 26th beginning at 9am. Join our naturalist Corina Godoy at the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area for a hands-on nature sketching experience! Learn to observe carefully while sketching plant structures and habitats, gaining a deeper appreciation for the beauty of the desert environment. #### **Invasion of Non-Native Plants: WEEDS at Their Worst**

You may recall a story in last year's *Tortoise Tracks* about Jun Lee, former President Roger Dale and his two sons, Kristin Berry, Ray Butler, and Laura Stockton pulling and digging up the Sahara or African mustard in spring. Sahara Mustard was first discovered here in November 2017. This noxious weed has spread at a very rapid rate from its source along the roads edging the 8MinuteEnergy solar development at the northwestern corner of the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area. Sahara mustard, a tumble mustard, moves rapidly across landscapes, and in this case, is carried by the prevailing southwesterly winds into the original Natural Area. As of last spring, it had moved east about a half mile or more, crossing parcels acquired for mitigation by the Desert Tortoise Preserve Committee into Cache Creek Wash and was on land acquired by the California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife several years ago for the Natural Area. It also has invaded public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management. This winter a crew from the American Experience Corps will be working to identify the eastern-most boundary and will be pulling up and bagging the mustards and other non-native species in late winter before they set seed.

#### Announcing the 2020 Photography Contest

The year we again have a sponsor for the 2020 Photography Contest with monetary awards for the best photos in six categories: Desert Tortoises, Landscapes, Close-up Flowers, Other, Birds, and Mojave Ground Squirrels. The following are requirements: the photograph must be taken on the Desert Tortoise Research Natural Area, with 600 dpi (higher preferred), and provided by electronic mail in .jpg format as single photos or as a collection in a zip file to photocontest@tortoise-tracks.org by June 10, 2020.

We advise crouching or lying on the ground to take photos of tortoises. If you sit or lie quietly, they may walk toward you. For close-up of flowers, we are especially looking for the belly flowers (flowers so small that seeing them requires you need to be on your belly to view). Some of these are not eye-catching but nevertheless produce lovely flowers when viewed through a close-up lens. They are important tortoise forage. These include: Hill Lotus (Acmispon [formerly Lotus] brachycarpus), a small creeping plant with tiny yellow flowers; the Dwarf Milkvetch (Astragalus didymocarpus); and forget-me-nots (genus Cryptantha) with tiny white flowers. Especially of interest are the taller Layne Milkvetch, with upward, curved pods (Astragalus laynae) and the Woody Bottlewasher (Eremothera [Camissonia] boothii). All can be found on the web at the Jepson eflora (https://ucjeps.berkeley.edu/eflora/). To access, type in the scientific name on the main page of the website, and you will be taken to the scientific descriptions, line drawings, and some photos. At the Natural Area, the plants can be found on the Animal Trail: the Hill Lotus and Dwarf Milkvetch are on some low hills along the trail and the Layne Milkvetch and Woody Bottlewasher are in the small drainages. After the end of March, you can see the line drawings of some favorite plant foods of tortoises on the new Kiosk panels!


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
