



OPEN TOUR OF THE DTNA: Sunday, May 4th is the date set for the Committee's open tour of the Desert Tortoise Natural Area this year. All are welcome to participate, but advance reservations are necessary in order to avoid an excessive impact on the tortoise habitat. It's first come, first served; please contact Laura Stockton as soon as possible, at 6201 Wible Rd., #66, Bakersfield, CA 93313; or (805)831-2325.

VISIT THE DTNA! All indications are that this should be an excellent year to plan your own tour of the Natural Area, because we expect a good display of wildflowers and therefore, a lot of tortoises that will be visible; particularly in April and May. A wealth of information about the animal and plant life of the area may be obtained at the Interpretive Center kiosk and along the marked nature trails. A parking lot and rest rooms have been provided. Be sure to bring a sun hat, a removable jacket or sweater and comfortable walking shoes. Also, an ample supply of drinking water, since there is none available there. Please remember that pets are not allowed in the area, and that camping must take place outside it. Above all, never pick up a wild tortoise except to take it off a road. If frightened, it may lose its moisture and eventually die from dehydration.

THE DESERT TORTOISE NATURAL AREA

ACCESS: From Los Angeles, the DTNA may be reached by traveling northwest on Interstate 5 to its intersection with Highway 14. Head east on 14 and through the town of Mojave. At California City Blvd., turn right and travel through California City to the Randsburg-Mojave Road (dirt). The Interpretive Center is located approximately 5 miles north of California City Blvd., just off the Randsburg-Mojave Road.
